The LEAD Act™ (Laila's Elopement Awareness & Dissemination Act)

A statewide initiative designed to ensure coordinated prevention, response, and training for autism-related elopement.

Key Components

- Increase awareness through education, outreach, support, and community engagement
- Develop safety plans by mapping local risks such as bodies of water and egress points
- Provide mandatory training for school staff and first responders
- Expand access to assistive safety technology, and family resources
- Ensure accountability through annual data collection and progress reporting



Maryland's First Steps: Purple Alert (2024) & Ace's Law (2025)

- O1 Implemented an emergency notification system for missing persons with Intellectual and Development Disabilities (Purple Alert, House Bill 195).
- Required schools to notify families, document incidents and create prevention plans for elopement (Ace's Law, House Bill 1204).
- O3 Both laws are great initial steps to a more comprehensive approach between first responders, family caregivers, and professional caregivers.

Statewide Goals: 2026-2028

- Train at least 25,000 school personnel and first responders
- Equip at least **5,000** family caregivers with life-saving tools and resource directories
- Achieve zero fatal elopement incidents in Maryland.
- Position **Maryland as a national model** for autism safety and response.

Empowering Families and Communities

- Builds trust and safety partnerships.
- Creates consistent crisis response plans across institutions.
- Strengthens communication between families and public safety.
- Protects student privacy and parental control.

National Crisis Overview

Nearly 50% of children who have autism have eloped at least once, some as frequent as once per week. This behavior typically begins around age four.

Hundreds of deaths tied to elopement, mostly

Families report emotional trauma and burnout.



Nationwide Stats

- ~55 million individuals between the age of 4-17 in
- **1 in 31 children,** roughly 2.9% of U.S. children about 1.5 million children – are on the spectrum.
- **49%** of these children are at risk of wandering or elopement approximately 750,000 children.
- 17% of elopements end are fatal.
- With 91% of wandering fatalities due to drowning.

- Dozens of reported elopement emergencies each year.
- Most involve young, nonverbal students during school
- No statewide system for elopement tracking or rapid
- Training and technology use varies by district.

Statewide Stats

- Approximately 889,900 school-aged children are enrolled in Maryland's public schools (pre-K through 12th grade).
- An estimated 1 in 43 Maryland children have autism based on prevalence among 8-year-olds - representing roughly 20,695 students statewide.
- Based on national wandering statistics, approximately 10,140 of these children are at risk for wandering/elopement, with some incidents occurring as often as once per week.
- Approximately 1,723 children with autism in Maryland may face an increased risk of death associated with elopement (about 17%).
- Approximately 1,567 children are at heightened risk of drowning related to elopement (about 91% of fatal outcomes).

Note: The prevalence of Autism continues to increase in the state of Maryland. The rate of early diagnosis is improving, meaning this issue will only get BIGGER

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
